## STREET TREE POLICY

Per Architectural Review Board Requirement Article 10, Section 6, it is the responsibility of the home owner maintain and replace the trees that are planted on the street facings.

Maintenance of these trees is at owner's expense and will include pruning, disease and pest control, as well as mulching.

As the trees in our community have matured, pruning is required on many trees. The street trees should not impede residents walking on sidewalks or vehicles on streets. As a guide line, street trees should be at least 72" above the sidewalk.

Replacement of trees is at owner's expense. The replacement tree will be a minimum of 2.5 inches in diameter and a height of 9-10 feet. The tree selection requirement has been established to maintain each street's beauty and character. See the attached tree selection guideline.

Note the elimination of the Ash and Pear trees from the Approved Street Tree Type. The Ash tree has been impacted by the Emerald Ash Bore. The Pear trees have been designated an invasive species and are no longer sold in Ohio.
